Ryerson University was originally established on September 16, 1948, by an Order-in-Council. It was established as a provincial polytechnical institute called the Ryerson Institute of Technology. On April 26, 1963, Ryerson Polytechnical Institute was established by (the "Original Act"). The Original Act transferred the conduct, management and control of the Ryerson Institute of Technology to the Board of the Ryerson Polytechnical Institute. The Original Act was amended in 1966 and 1971 before it was repealed and replaced

(the "1977 Act") on November

25, 1977. The 1977 Act has been amended five times, the first time in 1989. The second time in 1993, which included changing the name of the Ryerson Polytechnical Institute to Ryerson Polytechnic University. The third time in 2002, which included substituting the title of the 1977 Act with the

. The fourth time in 2007 and the fifth time in 2022, which included substituting the title of the 1977 Act with the . An official consolidated version of the amended 1977 Act is not available.

All property heretofore or hereafter, by statute or otherwise, granted, conveyed, devised or bequeathed to the Board, the University or to any person in trust for or for the benefit of the Board, the University or any of its divisions or departments, subject to any trust affecting the property, is vested in the University.
